Exhibiting a curved aluminium roof with triangular light panels the new Bridgford Road Stand is the work of Huw Evans, from Nottingham based architects Maber Associates. The practice is renowned for their designs, having won critical acclaim for creating futuristic forms that still preserve the all important essence of traditional English cricket grounds.

In addition to the Radcliffe Road and Fox Road Stands which have helped reshape this famous ground over the last eight years, the new Bridgford Road Stand forms part of an £8.2 million pound redevelopment that has seen spectator capacity increase to over 17,000, the introduction of floodlighting, a second electronic scoreboard and a fixed replay screen.

Called in at the last moment, due to supplier withdrawal, Quedron were more than happy to demonstrate their ability to resolve technical issues and supply a bespoke

product tailored to meet the client's needs. In this instance, concerns surrounded the feasibility of the 20m radius smooth curved roof combined with the requirement for a strip coated material finished to mimic weathered copper.

Dave Rue, Managing Director of Hickton Construction Limited stated; *"Quedron's swift technical response and ability to source non-standard materials internationally at short notice almost certainly prevented disastrous consequences to the critical path of this project's anticipated completion date"*.

The project included over 2900m<sup>2</sup> of Quedron 1067/20C profile for both the weathering skin and soffit linings, together with approximately 1200m<sup>2</sup> of bespoke cladding tray. The stand was officially opened on time, allowing increased capacity during the international test with New Zealand on June 5 2008.
